

Mission

The UCF India Center incubates ideas, research, and education on contemporary India—building academic bridges, enhancing cross-cultural understanding, and connecting communities across India and the United States. It promotes scholarship, interdisciplinary research, educational programs, partnerships, and outreach to the Indian American community in Florida and nationwide, while encouraging engagement with broader U.S. society through the dissemination of knowledge and cultural exchange.



Goals

- Strengthen The India Center's programming through regular organization of the Annual India Lecture Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series, and the Annual India Forum.
- Build partnerships with institutions in India for joint research and training, including facilitating an Indiaspecific Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program in STEM disciplines at UCF, exchanging PhD students, and exploring avenues for visiting faculty.
- Launch a practitioner-in-residence program for distinguished Indian decision-makers in government, scientific organizations, non-profits, and academia at the UCF India Center.
- Launch and expand the India Studies certificate program along with building The India Center internship program to train the next generation of India scholars at UCF and in the United States.
- Expand The India Center's networks with academia, think tanks, and the policy community through an India Center non-residential fellows' program.
- Collaborate with UCF Advancement and Partnerships to raise resources that support The India Center's goals, enhance student and faculty research and activities focused on India, and create new incentives and opportunities for UCF students and faculty to study contemporary India.
- Build partnerships with the Indian community in Central Florida and beyond and increase public awareness and interest about India, India-U.S. relations, and the UCF India Center.

Director's Message

e are delighted to present this annual report—my first as the inaugural Indian Community Endowed Chair and Director of the UCF India Center. This report not only highlights our achievements but also celebrates the vision and determination of those who laid the foundation for The India Center. Provost Michael Johnson, who has been the intellectual fountainhead and institutional memory of The India Center, continues to guide and support our mission. We are deeply grateful for his thoughtful message in this report. We also extend our thanks to Dean Josh Colwell for his message, and we look forward to working under his leadership at the College of Sciences. The establishment and growth of The India Center would not have been possible without the dreams, efforts, and support of UCF leadership, faculty, and students, as well as the Indian American community in Central Florida, who have worked tirelessly over the years to create this unique institution.

The 2024–2025 academic year was a landmark period for the UCF India Center, as we reached several significant milestones and strengthened our position as a hub for scholarship, dialogue, and engagement on India-related issues. Through our Annual India Lecture Series, we brought together leading voices from academia and policy to discuss issues of pressing relevance to both India and the United States. These lectures provided an avenue for students to engage with thought leaders, sparked intellectual curiosity across the campus, and built bridges between UCF, the Indian American community, and global networks of expertise. Topics ranged from India's ambitious technological pursuits and the application of artificial intelligence in medicine to evolving migration patterns and their policy implications.

One of the highlights of the year was our inaugural Distinguished Lecture, delivered by Dr. Vivek Lall, Chief Executive of General Atomics Global Corporation. Dr. Lall's expertise and global stature added immense value to our discussions. During his visit, he met with the deans of the College of Sciences and the College of Engineering and Computer Science, engaged with faculty, and participated in a dinner hosted in his honor by members of the Indian American community. The Distinguished Lecture Series is designed to feature scholars and practitioners whose work has significantly advanced the India-U.S. strategic partnership. By fostering these exchanges, The India Center aims to promote meaningful dialogue at the intersection of academia, policy, and practice, and to nurture deeper bilateral engagement through thought leadership and institutional collaboration.

We also organized our second Annual India Forum, Capturing Change in India: Economic Transformations, Technological Transitions, and Evolving Global Footprint, a daylong conference showcasing cutting-edge research from leading universities and think tanks across North America. The Forum generated a series of policy papers that will be published both on our website and in print. This initiative not only strengthens the Center's intellectual contributions but also positions UCF as an important voice in shaping policy dialogues on India. Our goal is to make the India Forum one of the nation's most compelling platforms for conversations about India's rise and global role, with active participation from scholars and policymakers in India and beyond.

Another significant milestone was the approval of our new India Studies Certificate program at UCF. This multidisciplinary program offers students a comprehensive understanding of India's politics, history, society, and international relations. Complementing this academic program, we revamped our internship offers to better align with the certificate, ensuring that students gain both academic knowledge and practical experience. Together, the certificate and internships will nurture the next generation of India-focused scholars, policymakers, and thought leaders at UCF.

As an incubator of ideas, research, and education on India, the Center serves a wide range of stakeholders. In the past year, we hosted 20 expert speakers, organized 17 academic and cultural events, participated in over 20 community engagements, and reached more than 1,000 in-person attendees and 12,000 online participants. Through collaborations with colleges, schools, and departments across UCF, as well as close engagement with the Indian American community, The India Center has significantly expanded its visibility and impact.

Our growing international recognition is equally gratifying. India's Ministry of External Affairs and the Observer Research Foundation sponsored a UCF student to take part in the student challenge at the prestigious Raisina Dialogue, India's premier global conference. We also hosted India's cybersecurity working group as part of the U.S. State Department's International Visitor Leadership Program, and I had the privilege of consulting directly with the U.S. State Department on India-related policy initiatives. Additionally, I was invited to

deliver a lecture to the 64th National Defense College (NDC) course in New Delhi, which included senior military officials and civil servants from India and several other countries. These developments underscore the India Center's role as a trusted partner in fostering high-level India-U.S. dialogue.

Looking ahead, we remain committed to our vision of establishing the UCF India Center as the nation's leading institution for ideas, research, and education on contemporary India. In the coming academic year, we will welcome two scientists from India as part of our new Scientist-in-Residence Program, funded by a grant from the Glenn W. Bailey Foundation—our first academic grant of this kind. We also plan to expand our non-resident fellows program, which will bring together leading academics and policymakers from both the U.S. and India. Additionally, we are collaborating with the UCF Foundation to establish a distinguished Board of Advisors to guide, mentor, and support the Center's strategic direction.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the unwavering support of UCF leadership, the enthusiasm of our students and faculty, the dedication of the Indian American community in Central Florida, and the commitment of our staff. Leila Chacko, together with our student office assistants and interns, works tirelessly to advance the mission of the India Center. We are deeply thankful to all who have contributed to our journey, and we look forward to building on this foundation to achieve an even greater impact in the years ahead.

UCF Invests Inaugural Indian Community Endowed Chair and Director

n November 2024, The India Center at the University of Central Florida reached a defining milestone with the investiture of Yogesh Joshi, Ph.D. as its inaugural Indian Community Endowed Chair and Director. This endowed position, made possible through the generous support of the Deshpande, Mehta, and Toleti families, marked a significant endorsement of the Center's mission to expand India-related scholarship, deepen cultural exchange, and enhance U.S.-India engagement.

The formal Investiture Ceremony was led by UCF Provost Michael D. Johnson and College of Sciences Dean and former Vice Provost for Strategic Initiatives Maggy Tomova. The event brought together university leaders, faculty, students, donors, and community members to celebrate the next phase of The India Center's growth. A classical Carnatic performance by Knights Khayal added cultural richness to the evening, underscoring the Center's commitment to showcasing India's diverse traditions.



Dr. Joshi brings to the role a wealth of scholarly expertise in India's international security and the Indo-Pacific region. His research examines how rising powers develop sophisticated weapon systems and deploy them on the modern battlefield. He previously led the Foreign Policy and National Security Program at the Institute of South Asian Studies, National University of Singapore (NUS), and was a MacArthur and Stanton Nuclear Security Fellow at Stanford University. His appointment signals an ambitious future for The India Center one that includes expanding interdisciplinary research and programming in areas such as technology, business, health, and global affairs, while continuing to build connections between Central Florida, India, and the broader Indian diaspora.



UCF is enriched by a significant number of Indian American faculty, staff, and students, with Indian students representing the largest group of international graduate students at UCF. An endowed professorship is a tremendous investment in The India Center's future, and we greatly appreciate our Founding Chairs and all the donors who made this possible.

Launch of The India Center's **Annual India Lecture Series**



India's Pursuit of Innovation Insights from Dhruva Jaishankar

n January 2025, The India Center welcomed Dhruva Jaishankar, Executive Director of ORF America, as the featured speaker for its inaugural Annual India Lecture. His presentation, "India's Quest for Technology," offered sharp insights into India's strategic ambitions and innovation landscape. The event, moderated by India Center Director Yogesh Joshi, Ph.D., spotlighted the Center's commitment to elevating conversations on India's global engagement and fostering thought leadership around emerging policy and technological challenges.



The University of Central Florida (UCF) has done what a lot more U.S. universities should do: made a serious investment in the study and understanding of contemporary India through the creation of The India Center. The Center has benefited from generous support from the local Indian-American community, is successfully leveraging the research strengths of the university, and benefits from the dynamism and vision of its Director. Mr. Jaishankar explored India's emergence as a global tech player, highlighting advancements in cybersecurity, AI, space exploration, and telecommunications. His analysis connected India's innovation trajectory to broader geopolitical and economic trends, offering insights into how technology is shaping India's international influence and domestic priorities.

Drawing from his recent book, Vishwashaastra, Jaishankar positioned India's technological ambition as part of a larger strategic vision. The lecture sparked discussion on the intersection of policy, innovation, and leadership in a rapidly changing global landscape.

The event was attended by students, faculty, and community members, demonstrating widespread interest and The India Center's expanding reach.



Confronting Dementia with Al Innovation for Global Impact

n February 19, 2025, The India Center at UCF hosted a timely lecture titled "AI and the Global Dementia Crisis: Opportunities for Innovation and Impact," featuring Vijaya Kolachalama, Ph.D. from Boston University's Chobanian and Avedisian School of Medicine.

Bringing together students, faculty, healthcare professionals, and community members, the event explored how artificial intelligence can help address the rising global burden of dementia—particularly in India, where limited access to neurological care presents urgent challenges.

Kolachalama shared his lab's work on multimodal AI systems designed to improve early diagnosis and decision-making through the integration of neuroimaging, biomarkers, and electronic health records. He emphasized Al's potential to support—rather than replace—clinical expertise, especially in under-resourced settings.

The lecture sparked rich discussion on the ethics of AI in healthcare, medical education, and cross-sector collaboration. Kolachalama also introduced "PodG," an educational AI platform, inspiring interest in its application at UCF.

Moderated by Dinender Singla, Ph.D., with UCF's College of Medicine, the event exemplified The India Center's mission to foster interdisciplinary dialogue and global engagement in technology and medicine.

Understanding India-U.S. Migration and Its Impact

n March, The India Center at UCF hosted a seminar featuring Devesh Kapur, Ph.D. a leading expert on migration and diaspora studies, titled "Indian Migration to the United States and Development in India."

Drawing from his acclaimed work *Diaspora*, *Development*, and *Democracy*, Dr. Kapur explored the post-1965 migration of Indians to the U.S.—one of the most selective and impactful migration waves in modern history. His presentation examined how Indian immigrants have become among the most educated and highest-earning groups in the United States, while raising critical questions about the effects of migration on both India and the U.S.

Topics included the role of U.S. immigration policy, the rise of Indian professionals in the technology sector, changing diaspora dynamics and, new trends in unauthorized migration.

The seminar sparked discussion on international education, labor policy, and India's demographic transition. This event reflected The India Center's commitment to interdisciplinary dialogue and its role as a bridge between academic inquiry and global policy conversations.

Insights from the Inaugural Distinguished Lecture

n the spring semester, The India Center launched its Distinguished Lecture series. Vivek Lall, Ph.D., Chief Executive of General Atomics Global Corporation delivered The India Center's inaugural Distinguished Lecture. The event marked a major milestone in the Center's mission to convene influential voices on strategic global issues—with a focus on science, technology, and innovation.

The day began with Dr. Lall participating in a series of meetings with UCF faculty and students, including the Deans of College of Sciences and the College of Engineering and Computer Science, facilitating insightful dialogue around research, innovation, and industry-academic partnerships. These sessions created opportunities for cross-disciplinary exchange and potential avenues for future collaboration.

Prior to the public lecture, guests from the university and community participated in a meet and greet with Dr. Lall, offering opportunities for personal dialogue and networking. This intimate pre-event gathering fostered meaningful engagement and highlighted the importance of building strong academic and industry relationships.



Dr. Lall's lecture, "U.S.-India Technology Opportunities," drew on his leadership roles at NASA, Boeing, Lockheed Martin, and the United Nations. He outlined promising areas of bilateral cooperation, including national defense, nuclear energy, space exploration, and joint innovation. He emphasized the significance of shared democratic values, growing economies, and the expanding tech startup ecosystem in driving strategic collaboration.

Moderated by Jayanta Kapat, Ph.D., Pegasus Professor and Director of CATER, the lecture included an audience Q&A and welcomed a wide-range of student groups, faculty, and community members. This inaugural event laid the groundwork for future Distinguished Lectures, positioning UCF as a hub for U.S.-India partnership and innovation.

n a landmark achievement this year, The India Center celebrated the official approval of its India Studies Certificate Program, slated to begin in Fall 2025. This academic milestone underscores the Center's ongoing commitment to broadening global learning opportunities and enhancing India-focused scholarship at UCF.

Created for undergraduate students across disciplines, the India Studies Certificate Program offers an intellectually enriching curriculum that weaves together courses in history, political science, religion, literature, and international relations. With a strong interdisciplinary foundation, the program invites students to explore India's dynamic political landscape, vibrant cultural traditions, religious diversity, and expanding global influence.

Students enrolled in the program will gain analytical tools and cultural fluency that are increasingly vital in careers related to international affairs, diplomacy, education, global development, and intercultural communication. By fostering deeper understanding of India's domestic and international dimensions, the certificate prepares graduates to navigate multicultural environments and contribute meaningfully to a globally connected workforce.

The program also reflects UCF's broader dedication to global engagement and international collaboration. By embedding India-centered studies within the undergraduate experience, The India Center continues to serve as a catalyst for cross-cultural dialogue and academic excellence.

Total Credits Required: 12 credit hours

- Core Courses (3 credits): Students must complete at least one course from a selection focused on Indian politics, foreign policy, or history. Additional core courses may count toward electives.
- Restricted Electives (9 credits): Students choose three courses from a diverse list covering South Asian history, literature, religion, humanities, and international politics.
- This flexible, interdisciplinary structure allows students to tailor their studies to personal interests while developing knowledge applicable to global careers.



n April 3, 2025, The India Center at UCF hosted its highly anticipated Annual India Forum titled "Capturing Change in India: Technological Transitions, Economic Transformations, and an Evolving Global Footprint." This event brought together an impressive assembly of scholars, policy experts, practitioners, and students to examine India's sweeping changes over the past thirty years. The program featured a series of focused panel discussions that delved into India's advances in technology, energy, and defense, unpacking their implications for domestic policy and regional strategy. Annual India Forum Keynote Address: Ajay Kumar, Ph.D., Former Defense Secretary of India.

s part of its 2025 Annual India Forum, The India Center at UCF was honored to host a keynote address by Ajay Kumar, Ph.D., former Defense Secretary of India and principal architect of the country's landmark defense innovation initiative, iDEX (Innovation for Defense Excellence). In a thought-provoking lecture titled "From Assembly to Innovation: India's Defense Industry Transformation Through iDEX," Dr. Kumar offered an incisive analysis of the dramatic evolution underway in India's defense sector.

Drawing from his experience at the helm of India's defense establishment, Dr. Kumar detailed the country's shift from a legacy license-based production system toward a fast-paced, innovation-centric ecosystem. He highlighted the emergence of defense-tech startups and the rise of deep-tech entrepreneurs as drivers of change, showcasing how policy reforms and strategic vision have played a catalytic role in advancing indigenous capabilities. His talk illustrated how iDEX has enabled the development of cutting-edge, scalable, and costeffective technologies—including unmanned aerial systems, advanced surveillance platforms, and quantum communication tools—delivering impact across sectors and security domains.

The keynote address resonated deeply with attendees and established a strong foundation for the broader themes of the conference: India's technological transitions, economic transformations, and growing influence in global affairs. Dr. Kumar's insights not only illuminated the strategic potential of innovation within national defense but also reaffirmed The India Center's role as a leading forum for policy dialogue, interdisciplinary scholarship, and international collaboration.

he India Center continues to invest in the next generation of globally engaged scholars and professionals through its robust and interdisciplinary student internship program. Offered during the summer, fall, and spring semesters, the program provides students with immersive opportunities to contribute to India-focused research, programming, and outreach while gaining valuable academic and professional experience. These internships are open to undergraduate students across disciplines and are designed to cultivate both subject-matter expertise and transferable skills.

Interns work across three specialized tracks—research, media, and technical support—each tailored to align with students' academic interests and longterm career goals. Research interns, primarily from the School of Politics, Security, and International Affairs, explore topics such as India's foreign policy, Indo-Pacific strategy, regional security dynamics, and India's evolving role in global governance. Media interns gain hands-on experience in event documentation, multimedia content creation, and community engagement, while technical support interns—often from computer science and related fields-manage digital platforms, embed media, troubleshoot IT issues, and contribute to web development and analytics.

Beyond skill-building, the internships fosters mentorship, cross-cultural awareness, and collaborative learning. Interns participate in workshops and seminars on Indian politics, culture, and international relations; assist with high-profile events featuring distinguished speakers and scholars; and engage directly with visiting dignitaries and community leaders. The program also encourages cultural immersion through participation in festivals, collaborative projects with Indian organizations, and opportunities to learn Indian languages.

he India Center was honored to receive an invitation to nominate a School of Politics, Security and International Affairs (SPSIA) graduate student to participate in the 2025 edition of the Raisina-IE Global Student Challenge. Hosted by the IE School of Politics, Economics & Global Affairs in collaboration with the Observer Research Foundation (ORF), New Delhi,

Interdisciplinary Engagement Campus Dialogues on Indian Literature



The event not only elevated awareness of a significant and sensitive topic within South Asian studies but also served as a model for the Center's broader commitment to supporting faculty scholarship and fostering informed dialogue. By convening diverse audiences around cutting-edge research, The India Center continues to fulfill its mission of connecting academic inquiry to lived experience and encouraging reflection on global human rights and societal transformation.

The celebration was a powerful reminder of the shared values of democracy, unity, and cultural pride—and a testament to The India Center's role in fostering meaningful connections across communities.










Global Engagements with India

Closing the series in May 2025, the roundtable "Operation Sindoor: Implications and Lessons for a Rising India" brought together Lt. Gen. Deependra Singh Hooda, Dr. Happymon Jacob, and journalist Suhasini Haider to discuss India's changing security posture in the aftermath of the India-Pakistan crisis.

Together, these virtual events underscored The India Center's commitment to providing thought leadership on India's evolving global role and strategic priorities.



Exploring AI and Ethics in India Key Insights from "Navigating the Crossroads"

he India Center at UCF launched its fall 2024 programming with a timely virtual event, "Navigating the Crossroads of Ethics and AI in India." A Strategic Dialogue on Economic **Aspiration and Reform**





n October 22, 2024, The India Center at UCF hosted "Making India an Advanced Economy by 2047: What Will It Take?," an engaging event examining India's long-term economic vision. The lecture featured Ajay Chhibber, Ph.D., Distinguished Visiting Scholar at George Washington University and Non-Resident Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council, and was moderated by Buvaneshwaran Venugopal, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Finance at UCF. Drawing on insights from his book Unshackling India, Chhibber outlined the economic, political, and institutional reforms needed to transform India into a \$21 trillion economy by its 100th year of independence. He emphasized the importance of state reform, investment in education and innovation, manufacturing-led job growth, and a renewed U.S.-India economic partnership. The event attracted a broad audience and sparked an engaging dialogue on growth, inequality, and global competitiveness, exemplifying The India Center's role in advancing thoughtful discourse on India's development in a rapidly changing world.
